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## ESNA Tapped to Host Mayor's One-and-Only Upper East Side Town Hall Meeting

For 60 minutes, on September 23, Mayor Mike held a standing-room only audience at the Lighthouse International, on E. 59<sup>th</sup> Street, captivated by his recollections of his first years in the city as a resident of E 66<sup>th</sup> Street and then by his mastery of the complexities facing New York today.

At the invitation of the Mayor's office, the evening was organized by ESNA, the 19th Precinct Community Council, the Holmes Houses on E. 91<sup>st</sup> Street and Lighthouse International who each were asked to invite 40 guests. The baked goods, coffee and bottled water were provided by Butterfield Market of Lexington Avenue.

When the Mayor entered the room, he was welcomed by Barry Schneider, ESNA president and master of ceremonies for the event, who said, "As I look around the room, and see leaders

of government, the health care community, civic and cultural organizations, I think this is the most extraordinary collection of talent, of human knowledge, that has ever been gathered together on the Upper East Side —



with the possible exception of when Michael Bloomberg dines alone."

When the Mayor came to the lectern, he acknowledged the elected officials in the room and then began by addressing, without notes, the issues of widespread interest to the community — the economic downturn, education, public safety and the city's

infrastructure. On the economy, he stated that "we'll have to learn to do more with less". Taxes may have to be raised and cuts in spending will have to be made. The Mayor feels that any problem can be



solved if children are well educated in good schools. He pointed out that New York's diverse population creates a great challenge; 170 different languages are spoken by the students' parents. During his tenure, the gap between ethnic groups success in school has narrowed, and teachers' salaries have risen 43 percent. When he took office in 2002, 12,000 of the 80,000 total teachers quit

each year. In the last two years, teacher resignations have dropped to 5,000 per year. And 50,000 people from elsewhere in the U. S. have applied to teach in NYC. He proudly related

that the city is currently rated the 15<sup>th</sup> safest of the nation's largest cities. Crime in the 19<sup>th</sup> Precinct is down 35% since 2001. The Mayor concluded his remarks by noting that the city's infrastructure is in good shape- new schools are being built and older school buildings are being improved; the construction of the third water

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tunnel is on target, and of the city's more than 700 bridges only two footbridges are substandard – and those will be brought up to a state of good repair in the immediate future.

The Mayor then turned the microphone over to Barry Schneider, ESNA president, who continued as master of ceremonies for the rest of the evening. Mr. Schneider called on members of the overflow audience who had questions for the Mayor. Assisted by the more than 20 department commissioners, commission chairmen and members of the NYPD and FDNY who were seated on either side of him, the Mayor and his team fielded questions on education, construction, traffic congestion and the Summer Streets program.

When the meeting ended, those in the room who had never before seen the Mayor in person left with great admiration for his fluency and his command of myriad facts and figures when speaking off the cuff. But it was his animated presence that had the crowd buzzing as they filed out of the auditorium. (It should be noted that after the Mayor left, many of his commissioners remained to speak with members of the audience.)

## Welcome P S 59!

213 E. 63<sup>rd</sup> Street update: The former nurses' dormitory of Manhattan Eye, Ear and Throat Hospital, long vacant and ever forbidding, is now the bright, new – temporary – home of P S 59. And now on the street you'll see scores of school-girls and school-



boys, with satchel and shining morning faces, skipping jauntily to school. For on September 2<sup>nd</sup>, Manhattan's first School Construction Authority-certified green school opened under the leadership of Principal Adele Schroeter and Assistant Principal Gabriel Feldberg. The new PS 59 includes a rooftop play area, a full-sized gymnasium, common learning areas, science laboratories, and spacious classrooms. The windows were

replaced and glazed with low E-coated glass, which helps keep heat out and light in. The building uses steam for heat. The building will serve as a temporary home for Public School 59, an elementary school. It will eventually relocate to 57th Street and 2nd Avenue. The 63rd street location will then become a new, 500-seat neighborhood school.
